MOLES PARADISE

What probably is the greatest tunneling job of all time is underway to bring an additional half billion gallons of water daily to the City of New York and, when they wish, to smaller communities along the route of the 85 mile aqueduct extending from Hill View Reservoir in Yonkers to, near Ellenville, in the Catskills. The route of the tunnel lies west of White Plains, passes under Kensico Reservoir at 1600 ft. below the surface, strikes northerly passing near Katonah, and Carmel, swings northwest passing under the Hudson a few miles north of Newburgh and continues in the same line to Merriman Dam at Lackawack.

13 1/2 miles of 19 1/2 ft. interior diameter concrete lined tunnel, 27 miles of 15 ft. diam. and 43 miles of 13 1/2 ft. diam. together with 23 access shafts and some purification works is being dome by 14 contractors for \$150 million dollars. Construction at Merriman Dam, including an additional 1/2 mile of 15 ft. tunnel and a mile of 13 1/2 ft., will cost \$19,000,000. Miscellaneous work brings the contract price to about 173 million for the first stage construction expected to add an average 100 million gallons daily to the city's supply. Construction of tunnels and dams to tap the Neversink River and East Branch of the Delaware River have not yet started but will add several million dollars in contract work and 370 million gallons of water daily to the city's system.

World tunneling records on the aqueduct last only a few days. First Geo. Underwood took it at Shaft 4 with a 1619 ft. advance at a single 17 ft. diameter (13 1/2 ft. lined) heading in 31 days. Then Alex Simpson at Shaft 5 drove 1862 ft., both for Walsh Construction Co. with Bill Durkin, manager, acting as referee. Out of the west came a claim of 1879 ft. in an 8x9 heading at Cripple Creek, Colorado by guys who aren't Moles. At press time Alex Simpson is again ahead with 2019 ft. in the North heading at Shaft 5 in the 31 working day period ending May 8. Rosoff, on an adjoining section has driven nearly 1200 ft. in a similar period thru rock that required timbering all the way.

The "Holing Thru" editors have elected all superintendents on record breaking jobs to full membership. All they need to do now is forward their dues.

Work on the first stage of the project is 40% complete, on a basis of contract payments, with excavation nearly 70% finished and lining under way on three contracts. Despite some bad ground conditions all work is well ahead of schedule and some contractors will finish nearly two years ahead of anticipated completion in 1944.
