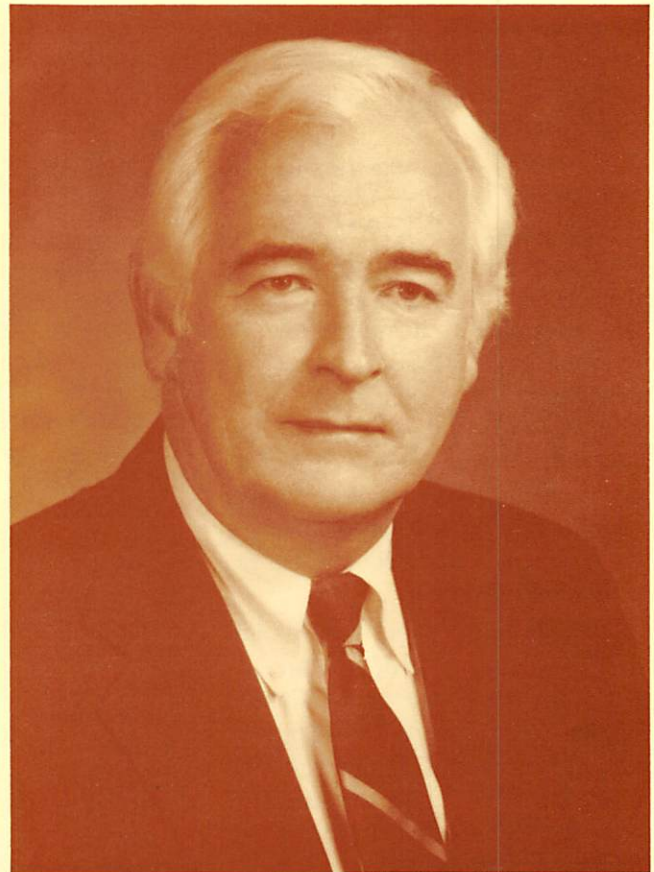

Tom Dailey has 40 years experience in the construction industry since his graduation from Denison University in 1953. After completing 2 years service in the U.S. Navy, he joined his father and brother in the family owned general contracting firm of R. E. Dailey & Co., in Detroit, Michigan. He served in a number of positions beginning with common laborer and progressing through superintendent, estimator and project manager. He was named President in 1968 and Chairman in 1975.

R. E. Dailey & Co., was one of just a few Midwest firms which engaged in both heavy and building construction. While being recognized as one of the area's leading building contractors, the company successfully completed many heavy-civil projects. Typical of these heavy construction projects were the I-76 Fisher Freeway Bridge on the Rouge River in Detroit; three Outlet Works for the Corps of Engineers in Ohio, Indiana and Kentucky; foundation caissons and cofferdams on the Ohio River for the Mauckport Bridge; and several Water Treatment Plants.

Tom has been very active in construction industry affairs. Notable achievements include the SIR Award from the Detroit Chapter of AGC, four separate nominations for the ENR Construction Man of the Year Award and service in 1981 as National AGC President. He was a founding director of the National Employer's Council and serves on the Contractor's Advisory Board of the Business Roundtable's Construction Committee. He is

recognized as a pioneer in labor-management relations as a result of his leadership in establishing one of the nation's first successful multi-trade bargaining organizations in Detroit and for serving as management's chief negotiator for twelve years.

In 1980 R. E. Dailey & Co. was acquired by the Perini Corporation and is now known as the Central U.S. Division of Perini Building Company (PBC), a wholly owned subsidiary. PBC Central operates throughout the central region of the United States.

In 1984 Tom relocated to San Francisco to manage Perini's Western Building Division. In 1986 he was named President of Perini's Construction Group and moved to the company's headquarters in Framingham, Massachusetts. In this position he had responsibility for all building and construction work nationwide. Subsequently, he was given responsibility for Perini International and Perland Environmental, the company's hazardous waste remediation subsidiary.

Some of the major projects undertaken during Tom's tenure at Perini include a major rehabilitation of the Lexington Avenue Subway line in New York City, construction of the Baldwin Bridge carrying I-95 over the Connecticut River in Old Saybrook, Connecticut; the "Can of Worms" interchange in Rochester, New York; the CANA cut and cover tunnel and interchange for the Central Artery in Boston; and Lock and Dam 5 for the Corps of Engineers on the Red River in Louisiana.

Tom retired from full time employment with Perini Corporation on January 1, 1994. He is a consultant to the company and continues as a member of the Board of Directors. He now resides in Jupiter, Florida with his wife Jan and spends his leisure time boating and on the golf course. Their daughter Jill Smith lives in River Forest, Illinois

Charlie Guild has advised The Moles office that he will be present that evening to receive his 40 Year Certificate.

HENRY BOSCHEN joined Raymond Concrete Pile Company upon graduation from Cornell University in 1928. He went on to spend his whole career with Raymond, becoming President and Chief Executive Officer in 1960. Parallel with his accomplishments at Raymond, Hank gave of himself to The Moles, serving as President in 1966. He went on to be honored with The Moles Member Award in 1969. Henry retired from Raymond in 1971 and currently resides in Essex, Connecticut.

CHARLES GUILD attended Wentworth Institute in Boston and began his career in the construction industry as a laborer and hod carrier. In 1945 he founded his own firm, C. L. Guild Construction Company, which performed heavy construction work.

Subsequently, his firm became a specialist in pile driving and Charlie was instrumental in developing new methods and equipment to drive piles. He has been described as a businessman, and inventor, a contractor and an equipment expert. 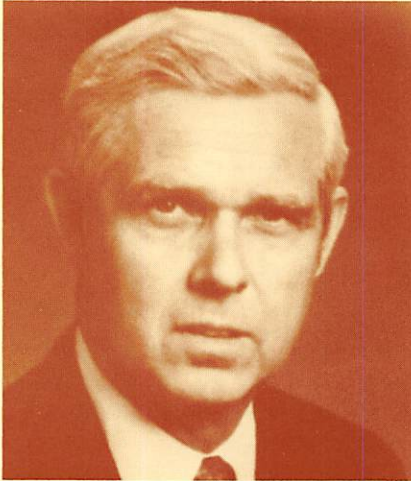

A MOMENT OF SILENCE



Past President and 1994 Moles Member Award Recipient, CHARLIE H. CAMPBELL, died suddenly at Newark Airport on March 9, 1994. Charlie spent almost his whole career with Peter Kiewit Son's, Inc. serving as President of Kiewit Construction Group and more recently as Vice Chairman of Peter Kiewit Son's, Inc. Charlie was on his way to Denmark to check on a major Kiewit underground project at the time of his death.

A 1955 civil engineering graduate of the University of Kentucky, Charlie entered the Air Force following graduation, serving in Sioux City, Iowa and in Korea. He worked for four years for the Kentucky Department of Highways, joining Kiewit in 1961. After initial assignments in Kentucky, Charlie moved on to Kiewit projects in New York State, Wilmington, Delaware and Philadelphia, where he became Area Manager. Then he went on to Albany, New York and Cleveland, Ohio. In 1979 he was moved to the company's Omaha headquarters and promoted to Vice President.

Charlie Campbell gave great service to The Moles and to his Company. He was a person of high character and competence. He will be missed by all of his many friends in the construction industry.

GUIDO CIVETTA died on March 22, 1994. He was President of Guido Civetta Construction Corp. This firm

and its predecessor company, Corinno Civetta Construction Corp., was active in deep excavation and foundation work throughout the New York Metropolitan area. Guido was a civil engineering graduate of City College. He was 70 years old at the time of his death.

EDWARD D. GRANDLE died on September 9, 1993 but The Moles office was not informed until January 1994. Ed became a Mole in 1971 when he was working for Raymond International. He graduated from the University of Kansas and received a Fulbright Scholarship, and did graduate work at the Delft Technological University in Holland. He worked on many major projects for Raymond including the BART tunnel in San Francisco and the U.S. Naval Base on Garcia Island.

After leaving Raymond as Sr. Group Vice President, Ed founded his own consulting firm, living and working in Houston, Texas. He was 63 at the time of his death.

LEO M. HALLEY died suddenly on March 1, 1994. Leo attended Manhattan College where he earned his civil engineering degree. In 1960, he joined the Port Authority and continued with that organization until his retirement in 1988. At that time he held the position of Assistant Director in the Rail Transportation Department.

In 1970 Leo received the Port Authority Executive Director's Award of Achievement in recognition of his superb accomplishments with regard to the foundation and perimeter wall construction of the World Trade Center and in 1987 he was honored with the Port Authority's Distinguished Service Medal.

WALLACE L. HUNT passed away on February 11, 1994 in Florida after a courageous battle against cancer. He was 69 years old.

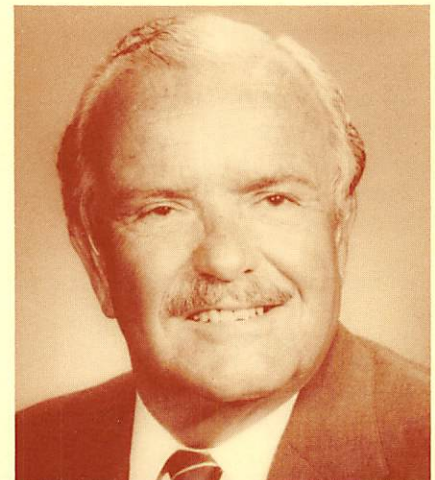
At the time of his admission to The Moles in 1972, Wallace was Executive

Vice President of Fruin-Colnon Corporation, where he subsequently became President. He became a Construction Consultant in 1982 and practiced in Georgia before moving to Jupiter, Florida. He was a civil engineering graduate of the University of Oklahoma.

JOSEPH S. WARD died suddenly on January 10, 1994 at his Stuart, Florida home. He was 68. He had undergone by-pass surgery last fall and was thought to be making good progress in his recovery.

After earning a civil engineering degree from Manhattan College in 1940 and a Master's degree from Rutgers University, he taught soils engineering at Cooper Union in the 1940's. He opened his own consulting firm in 1950, specializing in soils and foundation engineering. In 1978, Joe merged his firm with Converse, Davis, Dixon of Pasadena, California and served as President and CEO of that company. He left the firm in 1980 and moved back to the East Coast, and became active in forensic engineering.

Joe Ward served as President of the American Society of Civil Engineers in 1979 and was honored by Manhattan College with Doctor of Science degree in 1988. Joe became a Mole in 1988 and was a regular attendee at Moles functions.

Art Fox presented the Non Member award to LES McCRAW of Fluor Corporation. Les gave a talk that made all of us proud to be a part of the construction industry.

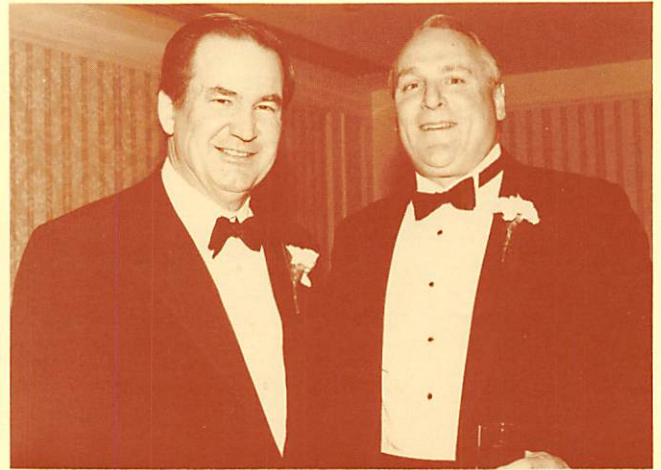
